



St. Mary's Outreach Center News for January 2021

For the month of *January*, we assisted **77** families with food for a total of **201** people of which **48** were children and **22** were elderly. The food items included approximately **462** items of food from our pantry (purchased by pantry and from your donations). In addition, St. Mary's Outreach Center is a distribution site for USDA commodities from Harvesters Food Network under TEFAP and the food baskets included approximately **2,623** items of food in January. In addition, approximately **20** homeless were served at various locations by one of our volunteers. The homeless bags include approximately **15** items of ready-to-eat food, socks and hygiene items.

91 items of clothing were given out, **7** coats and **6** blankets in addition to numerous pairs of gloves, hats and scarves. Two packages of diapers and wipes were given. Thanks to our Board Members and volunteers totaling **32** who put in **335** hours in support of our services.

We have been truly blessed this season with clothing items and no longer need any winter clothing items. However, with at least another month of potential winter weather, we would appreciate and gloves, coats and hats, especially for men.

Donations should be brought to the Outreach on Tuesday mornings between the hours of 9 a.m. and 12 p.m.

We are continuing social distancing and will be serving clients for food <u>BY APPOINTMENT ONLY</u> at 816-252-8649. The clothing room has been opened on a limited number basis.
