

Gospel Reflection by Dr. Scott hahn

Like a king making ready for battle or a contractor about to build a tower, we have to count the cost as we set out to follow Jesus.

Our Lord today is telling us up front the sacrifice it will take. His words aren't addressed to His chosen few, the Twelve, but rather to the "great crowds"—to anyone, to whoever wishes to be His disciple.

That only makes His call all the more stark and uncompromising. We are to "hate" our old lives, to renounce all the earthly things we rely upon, to choose Him above every person and possession. Again He tells us that the things we have—even our family ties and obligations—can become an excuse, an obstacle that keeps us from giving ourselves completely to Him (see Luke 9:23–26, 57–62).

Jesus brings us the saving wisdom we are promised in today's First Reading. He is that saving Wisdom.

Weighed down by many earthly concerns, the burdens of our body and its needs, we could never see beyond the things of this world; we could never detect God's heavenly design and intention. So in His mercy He sent us His Spirit, His Wisdom from on high, to make straight our path to Him.

Jesus Himself paid the price to free us from the sentence imposed on Adam, which we recall in today's Psalm (see Genesis 2:7; 2:19). No more will the work of our hands be an affliction; no more are we destined to turn back to dust.

Like Onesimus in today's Epistle, we have been redeemed. We have been given a new family and a new inheritance, made children of the Father, brothers and sisters in the Lord.

We are free now to come after Him, to serve Him—no longer slaves to the ties of our past lives. In Christ, all our yesterdays have passed. We live in what the Psalm today beautifully describes as the daybreak, ready to be filled with His kindness. For He has given us wisdom of heart and taught us to number our days aright.

Now to (Dake the Consecration

- ₩ Recite the daily prayers which include the Litany of St. Joseph, a prayer to St. Joseph from the tradition, and a daily act of consecration;
- A Receive the Sacrament of Confession during the consecration, so that both the soul is cleansed and able to receive the graces most fully and also as a very practical way of asking St. Joseph to show us the areas in our life that we need his help most and where we can better follow his example;
- ₩ Make a noteworthy act of charity each week which could be a contribution to the Church or a quality charitable organization, to an individual in need, it could be time spent volunteering, making a meal for someone calling and speaking to someone isolated or with whom you haven't spoken for a long period of time;
- ♣ Abstain from meat on Wednesdays (in addition to the ordinarily prescribed days of abstinence or fast).

Consecrating ourselves to St. Joseph:

The people at St. Joseph the Worker, St. Ann's, St. Cyril's and St. Mary's will begin a consecration to St. Joseph on September 7th. In making this consecration, the people of St. Joseph the Worker are inviting him to continue as their Spiritual Father, and St. Mary's recognizes a new relationship that the parish will have with her most Chaste Spouse. A natural question follows: What exactly is a consecration and why do we consecrate ourselves to a saint?

Consecration of one's self to a Saint, especially those as beloved as the Blessed Virgin Mary or her Holy Spouse, St. Joseph, is an act of individual devotion that comes from an expression of great love and reverence, and bears significant fruit in our desire for a life of Holiness. Through this act of consecration we draw ourselves under the protective cloak and rod of St. Joseph. This often hidden Saint, who took up the charge of protecting and being the guardian of both the Son of God and the Mother of God not only provides us with an example of heroic virtue and is the exemplar of Faith among men, but has joyfully and readily accepted the Fatherhood of all his adopted children. In this way, his title as Foster Father is a most beautiful gift and should remind us of the true parenthood of all foster parents.

In accepting Mary as his spouse, the one who became the icon of the Church and Mother of all those baptized in Christ, Joseph has become the Foster Father of all. Would it not seem reasonable that he would treat each of his adopted sons and daughters with the same love, compassion, strength, loyalty, fervor and care that he gave to the Child Jesus. It is in this light that St. Teresa of Jesus, and countless other Saints, have turned their pleas, petitions and devotions to the Beloved Saint and Foster Father, and give testimony that he has never failed in providing for any petition that was asked of him, or did not correct the petition to something good and worthy of Divine fulfillment.

By consecrating ourselves to St. Joseph we first recognize his great and truly Chaste Love that he has for us and his desire, like any good father, for our maturity and growth in our life in our Heavenly Father; we grow in friendship with him by spending time with him in prayer and coming to know more about him and the work that continues to do for the Kingdom; and we invite him in a persistent and explicit way to be our Spiritual Father, to guide and protect us in our spiritual life.
