BULLETIN COLUMN
25TH SUNDAY IN OT



There are many unique aspects to our faith in the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, and the God of our Lord Jesus Christ. One of these aspects is that our Lord speaks of his followers as stewards. We are slaves no longer, and in fact, many other religions paint humanity in a light as either slaves to a higher power or, if not slaves, remaining subject to the whims of an uncontrolled power. In Buddhism one must tread carefully through this life so as to not cause offense and so be reincarnated in a better state in the next life; Islam, which itself means **submission**, is built on the pillar of submitting to the rule of another--this is why women in an Islamic state are treated so harshly and we do not see any Islamic democracies. That our Lord spoke of the people of God as stewards of the Father's vineyard or mansion is unique and significant.

As we see in this Sunday's Gospel, a steward is given responsibility and care over the Master's household. He is trusted with following the Master's desires, of acting as the Master would act and is given full freedom of choice and action. Unlike a slave, a steward benefits and shares in the property and goods of the Master. While he may not eat at the table of the Master, he is free to choose what food he eats, and what food is prepared for those who has been put in his charge.

In the household, there is not just a single steward, but many stewards. Every steward and servant has been appointed the caretaker of someone or some thing so that every one is called to become like the Master of the house and receives and shares in the goods of the house. And just as there are many stewards, as all who live in Christ have been appointed a steward, there are also many properties, many mansions and vineyards, but there is just one Master and truly one vineyard.

The Church in the United States is a vineyard, as is the Church in Mexico and the Church in Ukraine and Russia are also vineyards, but they are of one Vineyard. The Church in Missouri is a vineyard, as is the Church in California, and in Kansas, yet they are all part of one vineyard. The Church in Independence is a vineyard, as is the Church in Grandview, in St. Joseph and in Kansas City, yet we remain in one vineyard of the Lord. The good steward does not say: let me take care of my vineyard so that it may be better than all of the other of the Master's vineyards. If the Master should send His steward to another vineyard, the good steward goes joyfully and gives as much attention because it too belongs to the Master. The good steward serves the Owner of the house, not the house itself. Likewise, we do not share only in the goods of the house in which we live, but in all of the goods of the Master.
