Prepare Your Heart for Advent:

For many of us, as we move through the season of Ordinary Time, from the 17th week and into the weeks of the 20s, the calendar becomes humdrum; we can fall into a monotonous rhythm of moving from one week to the next: 21st, 22nd, 23rd week . . . But as the liturgical calendar turns to the 30s, our attention may begin to perk up. 31st, then the 32nd week, which means that the 33rd and final Sunday of Ordinary time is just around the corner. The end of the year is coming. It's time to start preparing for Advent.

We are reminded of the closeness of Advent and Lent. One may even consider them to be twin seasons. During Advent, we prepare for the birth of Christ, the promised messiah in whom salvation has arrived and in Lent, we prepare for the crucifixion and resurrection of our Lord, completing the work of salvation and glory. Both Advent and Lent are seasons of penance and fasting. This is why they have both been given violet as the liturgical color. These are also the only two times of the year when the priest wears Rose Vestments-- on the 3rd Sunday in Advent and 4th Sunday of Lent. In both seasons, the Holy Spirit compels us to enter into the desert. And yet, at the very same time, each has a very different personality.

While in Lent, we go into the desert in imitation of Christ who entered the desert and fasted for 40 days. But in Advent, we go into the desert because that is where we find the birth of Christ. We go out so that we can see him. Our penance in Lent is focused on making reparation for our sins; in Advent, our penance is more about placing ourselves in solidarity with a world that is in need. Advent is a time when the world cries out for its long awaited savior. We quiet our hearts and lives, so that we can better hear the cries of the poor, those of our brothers and sisters in need, of the suffering, the lonely, the brokenhearted, the sick, imprisoned and disabled. When we speak of a world that lies in darkness, in Advent, it is the world and those who have not received the light of faith, in Lent, the darkness comes from remembrance of the suffering of our Lord and our separation from Him.

Advent and Lent both call us to fasting. The fasting of Lent is a fasting of sacrifice, while in Advent, it is a fasting that is meant to help quiet the heart and remind us of what is truly life-giving. One could say that in Lent we enter the desert, in Advent, we seek to become more like a desert. In the starkness, the stillness, the seclusion and patience of the desert, we are better able to receive what God desires to give us; that we make of ourselves, preparing a place in heart, like that of the manger and place of Christ's birth.
