

Keeping all these things in our hearts...By Sister M. Regina Tenebrae

Today, on Palm Sunday, we enter into the holiest week of the year, which culminates with the celebration of the Sacred Triduum of Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday.

As the Sacred Triduum draws near, there are many changes in the Sacred Liturgy which alert us that this is not simply "ordinary time." Already last week, at what is often called the First Passion Sunday, statues and crucifixes were covered. In the Extraordinary Form of the Holy Mass, the praying of Psalm 42 at the foot of the altar has been omitted. On Holy Thursday, after the celebration of the Lord's Supper, even the Blessed Sacrament is taken away. The altar is stripped and the church feels like a tomb. Bells are no longer rung. On Good Friday, there is not even a Holy Mass, but only the Good Friday Service.

It is not surprising that the Divine Office is also quite different during these most sacred days. The first two hours of the Breviary are Matins and Lauds and these two hours take the form of a special and symbolic service during the Sacred Triduum called the Tenebrae. The word, "Tenebrae" comes from the Latin word for darkness because these two hours are celebrated while it is still dark. Typically, the lights are not turned on, but only small candles, held by each person individually, are used to be able to read. All is dark in the church and all is dark outside to symbolize both the darkness of evil and the darkness of life without our Savior.

The tone of the psalms, canticles and lessons of the Tenebrae is mournful. The Lamentations of Jeremiah that are sung during *Tenebrae* were composed by the prophet Jeremiah after the destruction of Jerusalem and the beginning of the Babylonian captivity. They begin: "And it came to pass, after Israel was carried into captivity, and Jerusalem was desolate, that Jeremias the prophet sat weeping, and mourned with this lamentation over Jerusalem, and with a sorrowful mind, sighing and moaning." In *The Liturgical Year*, Dom Prosper Gueránger explains the ceremony of the Tenebrae office:

There is an impressive ceremony peculiar to this Office which tends to perpetuate its name. There is placed in the sanctuary, near the altar, a large triangular candlestick, holding fifteen candles... At the end of each psalm or canticle, one of these fifteen candles is extinguished; but the one which is placed at the top of the triangle is left lighted. ... Then the master of ceremonies takes the lighted candle from the triangle, and holds it upon the altar, on the epistle side, while the choir repeats the antiphon after the canticle: after which he hides it behind the altar during the recitation of the Miserere and the prayer which follows the psalm. As soon as this prayer is finished, a noise is made with the seats of the stalls in the choir, which continues until the candle is brought from behind the altar, and shows, by its light, that the Office of Tenebrae is over....

Let us now learn the meaning of these ceremonies. The glory of the Son of God was obscured and, so to say, eclipsed, by the ignominies He endured during His Passion. He, the Light of the world, powerful in word and work, Who but a few days ago was proclaimed King by the citizens of Jerusalem, is now robbed of all his honors. He is, says Isaias, the Man of sorrows, a leper (Is 53:3,4). He is, says the royal prophet, a worm of the earth, and no man (Ps 21:7). He is, as He says of himself, an object of shame even to his own disciples, for they are all scandalized in him (Mk 14:27) and abandon Him; yea, even Peter protests that he never knew Him. This desertion on the part of His apostles and disciples is expressed by the candles being extinguished, one after the other, not only on the triangle, but on the altar itself. But Jesus, our Light, though despised and hidden, is not extinguished. This is signified by the candle which is momentarily placed on the altar; it symbolizes our Redeemer suffering and dying on Calvary. In order to express His burial, the candle is hidden behind the altar; its light disappears. A confused noise is heard in the house of God, where all is now darkness. This noise and gloom express the convulsions of nature when Jesus expired on the cross: the earth shook, the rocks were split, the dead came forth from their tombs. But the candle suddenly reappears; its light is as fair as ever. The noise is hushed, and homage is paid to the Conqueror of death."

The young Sisters in our *Labor Mariae* community have never experienced the Tenebrae, and we will therefore be visiting the Benedictine Sisters of Mary, Queen of Apostles in Gower during the Sacred Triduum, in order to experience the Tenebrae and in order to learn how to pray it. Perhaps we will be able to offer the Tenebrae at Saint Mary's next year! Although we will miss being at Saint Mary's for the Sacred Triduum, we look forward to being home again on Easter Sunday! We wish you a blessed Holy Week!
