Keeping all these things in our hearts By Sister M. Regina

Since the time of His Ascension, our glorious Lord is present physically in only two places: in heaven and in the Blessed Sacrament. Just think of it, that here on earth, we are able to be in the presence of the same glorious Jesus Whom the hosts of angels and all the saints adore in heaven! Father Matthew Bartulica often reminds us in his homilies that Jesus in the Holy Eucharist is our greatest treasure and that we can never have sufficient gratitude for the immense gift of being able to receive Him in Holy Communion.

In addition to receiving Jesus in Holy Communion, we are also able to adore Him in His Eucharistic presence, both His presence in the tabernacle and His presence in the monstrance.

It often strikes me that when Jesus is exposed in the monstrance, He is making Himself vulnerable for us. In the tabernacle, He is safely behind lock and key in a solid "house," but in the monstrance, He is not safe. We may leave the church unattended when Jesus is in the tabernacle, but we may not leave Jesus alone when He is exposed in the monstrance. The document on Eucharistic Adoration, says that prolonged expositions should be held only if there is an appropriate number of faithful so that the Blessed Sacrament is not left unattended (see the paragraph in question quoted at the end of the present article). No one is to leave Jesus in the monstrance unattended because the assigned adorer is, so-to-speak, Jesus' protector. In the sense that the adorer is a "security guard," he is imitating the angels. As the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* tells us, the angels were the ones who protected Jesus especially during His infancy (see no. 333).

More important than guarding Jesus, the adorer unites himself with the angels in adoring Him. The angels ceaseless worship and adore God: "And all the angels were standing around the throne ... and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God" (Rev. 7:11). The adorer unites himself with the angels.

When we stand before the Throne of Almighty God during an adoration hour, we have, as it were, an hour-long appointment with Him. We are granted the privilege of a *tête-à-tête*, an intimate conversation, a *cor ad cor*, in which our hearts may rest on His Heart (cf. Jn. 13:23). It is entirely out of place to respond to the telephone while in adoration, or to have conversations with other people who may be present in the chapel. If we chat with other people during adoration, it is as though we invited someone to our home, and then left him alone in the parlor while we went to talk to someone else in the kitchen. Just as we do not eat and drink when we come to Holy Mass, in the same way we do not eat or drink during our adoration hour. We come for *HIM*---we can eat and drink at other times (except for emergencies and medical reasons, of course).

The greatest gift we can give to anyone is the gift of ourselves. When we make an hour of adoration, that is the gift we give to Jesus. We give to Him what is most precious to us: giving Him the gift of our time and giving Him the gift of our attention. Even if we do not know *what* to pray or *how* to pray, it suffices to *he* there. He loves to be with us and longs for us. We can be like the peasant in Ars who, in response to St. John Mary Vianney's question about what he did when he came to pray in the church, said: "I look at Him and He looks at me." (see *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, no. 2715).

Let us thank our Risen Savior, Who has not left us orphans, but Who remains with us, especially in the Holy Eucharist. Let us be grateful for the gift we have at Saint Mary's of exposition of the Blessed Sacrament! Deo gratias!

86. In churches where the eucharist is regularly reserved, it is recommended that solemn exposition of the blessed sacrament for an extended period of time should take place once a year, even though this period is not strictly continuous. In this way the local community may meditate on this mystery more deeply and adore.

This kind of exposition, however, may take place, with the consent of the local Ordinary, only if there is assurance of the participation of a reasonable number of the faithful.

Volunteer Mary Margaret Robertson took her two grandchildren, Addi and Chance shopping with her to purchase the items and had them help her bring the items to the Outreach Center. We would also like to recognize **Brad Davis** for his tireless efforts in hauling all the items from the church to the Outreach Center where all the items were counted by the Tuesday morning shift of volunteers.
