

Of Smoke and Smells....



During Sundays of Eastertide, and also every Tuesday and Thursday evening at 6:00 P.M., we see and smell incense at Saint Mary's. Why do we use incense?

The word incense comes from the Latin word "incendere" which means to burn. The incense is kept in a sacred vessel which is called an incense boat. The incense is transferred by means of a spoon to the thurible (also called a censer), which is a sacred vessel for burning incense. A burning coal is placed in the thurible or censer, so that the incense will burn. The thurible is swung on a chain to disperse the aromatic smoke.

The burning of incense is ancient. The Lord instructed Moses to build a golden altar for the burning of incense (cf. Ex 30:1-10), which was placed in front of the veil to the entrance of the meeting tent where the ark of the covenant was kept. In the Temple in Jerusalem, incense was burned daily.

There are many reasons for the use of incense, and I will mention but a few. Since it is so ancient, the rite is rich in symbolic meaning. Frankincense was and is expensive and, for that reason, it was a gift that symbolized kingship (which is the reason it was presented to the Infant Jesus on Epiphany). Burning of incense is a sign of homage given to Christ as our King.

The burning of incense is a sign of our self-gift. Just as Mary gave the precious gift of ointment (nard) to pour on Jesus' feet (cf. Jn 12:1-8), so the gift of expensive Frankincense is a symbol of our self-gift to God. In the Gospel account of the anointing of Jesus, Judas Iscariot objects: "Why was this ointment not sold for three hundred denarii and given to the poor?" (Jn 12:4). Jesus' response to Judas, as recounted in the Gospel of Saint Matthew, explains why, even today, we "waste" incense for Jesus: "Why do you trouble the woman? For she has done a beautiful thing to me?" (Mt. 26:10).

The burning of incense is a symbol of our prayer. The rising smoke symbolizes our prayers rising up to heaven. The Psalmist prays: "Let my prayer be directed as incense in Your sight" (Ps. 140). In the Book of Revelation, we read of the burning of incense in the context of the heavenly Liturgy: "And another angel came, and stood before the altar, having a golden censer; and there was given to him much incense, that he should offer up the prayers of all saints upon the golden altar, which is before the throne of God. And the smoke of the incense of the prayers of the saints ascended up before God from the hand of the angel" (Rev. 8:3-4).

When incense is used at Holy Mass, it is used around the altar (at the beginning of Holy Mass, for example), it is used for the crucifix and the Paschal candle, it is used for the Gospel book (which is incensed before the Gospel is proclaimed), it is used for gifts of bread and wine, and for the ministers and the faithful (at the time of the offertory). It is used also at the time of the consecration. Incense is used at Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament and during processions. On the Feast of Corpus Christi, there will be a Eucharistic Procession at Saint Mary's, and incense will be used. Incense is also used at Funeral Masses, at the absolutions of the dead.

In the Extraordinary Form, the priest offers the following prayers while incensing the altar at the time of the offertory. He first blesses the incense, with the following prayer: "Through the intercession of blessed Michael the Archangel standing at the right hand of the altar of incense, and of all His elect, may the Lord vouchsafe to bless this incense, and to receive it in the odor of sweetness. Through Christ our Lord." As he incenses the bread and wine he prays: "May this incense, which You have blessed, O Lord, ascend to You, and Your mercy descend upon us." He incenses the altar, praying: "Let my prayer, O Lord, be directed as incense in Your sight: the lifting up of my hands as an evening sacrifice. Set a watch, O Lord, before my mouth, and a door round about my lips. Incline not my heart to evil words: to make excuses in sins." The priest then hands the thurible to the deacon, saying: "May the Lord enkindle within us the fire of His love, and the flame of everlasting charity. Amen."

May all of our life be like incense, like a pleasing offering to God, like a sweet-smelling offering made to Christ our King. As Saint Paul writes to the Corinthians, we "For we are the good odor of Christ unto God" (2 Cor 2:15).
