

#### Summer Travel...By Sister M. Regina

Many people, we Sisters included, use the summer time for travel. I would like to reflect upon two types of travel, vacation and pilgrimage, in the context of the rhythm of work and rest.

As the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* explains, "in work, the person exercises and fulfils in part the potential inscribed in his nature" (no. 2428). Work as such is a good and is an expression of our human dignity. Even before the Fall, Adam and Eve were instructed by God to work: to "fill the earth and to subdue it" (Gen 1:28). The Fall has marked work, just as it has marked all of life, so that work is no longer easy and pleasant, but often is difficult and tiresome.

Time off from work responds to a genuine human need for rest of mind and body. As the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* notes, "human life has a rhythm of work and rest" (no. 2184). The summer offers many of us an opportunity for needed rest and leisure.

In the United States, we often use the word "vacation." Children have summer vacation from school. Our time off from our work is our vacation time. According to the New Century Dictionary, "vacation" means "being free from or exempt from duty." We think of related words such as "vacate" and "vacuum." To "vacate" means to "empty out" and a vacuum is an empty space. Notice that "vacation" is essentially negative: it means that we do not work. What is not included in the word "vacation" is the purpose of our temporary exemption from work. Oftentimes, in our society, people long for, maybe even live for, vacation and for "time off". Society tells us that vacation is a time to indulge, to enjoy, to be free from duty. While we need rest and leisure, it is not good to overindulge, to seek our comfort in every way, to seek to be free from all duties. If that were vacation, it would make the return to daily life more challenging. Our Christian life of virtue requires effort and when we relax our efforts and allow ourselves to fall back into selfishness, it is all the more difficult to return to the practice of virtue. The purpose of leisure is to help us to live more fully and more joyfully our everyday life. We do not work in order to have time for vacation, but we take vacation in order to work better. Work is not an evil to be avoided.

The British commonly use the word "holiday" rather than "vacation" to describe times of leisure and rest. I rather prefer the use of "holiday." As you may suspect, the word derives from the words "holy day" which refer to the holy days in the Church's calendar. Holy days, which includes Sundays, the *Catechism* tells us, help "everyone to enjoy adequate rest and leisure [and] to cultivate their familial, cultural, social, and religious lives" (no. 2184). Notice that the word "holiday," unlike "vacation" includes in its meaning a *positive purpose*: we have leisure from work in order to cultivate familial, cultural, social and religious aspects of our life.

In his essay, "On Certain Modern Writers and the Institution of the Family," G. K. Chesterton makes some telling remarks about travel. He notes that man sometimes travels in order "to escape from the street in which he lives." He travels in search of adventure, but when he does so, he necessarily fails because adventure refers to something that comes to us (from the Latin *advenire*), not to something that we attain or plan. Why does man seek to escape from his own home? Because he is afraid. "What we dread about our neighbors, in short, is not the narrowness of their horizon, but their superb tendency to broaden it."

Travel, like the word "vacation" has no inbuilt meaning of purpose. We can travel for many reasons. One form of travel which is distinctly religious and has an in-built purpose is the making of a pilgrimage. A pilgrimage is a journey undertaken for the sake of arriving at a holy place. During a pilgrimage, we seek not so much physical rest as spiritual rest. The pilgrim travels light and has his eyes set on the destination. The destination of the holy place provides him with leisure to pray, to rest his heart on the Heart of Jesus, to learn from the saints. A pilgrimage provides the spiritual refreshment that enables us to return to our everyday life with fresh energy and enthusiasm.

What could be some destinations for a pilgrimage? We Sisters have just concluded a pilgrimage to the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe in La Crosse, Wisconsin. It is a beautiful Shrine, a place of prayer in which one senses the presence of Our Lady. I hope that many of you will be able to make a pilgrimage to the Shrine, at some time. There are many other destinations for pilgrimages, even destinations nearby, such as the places blessed by the presence of Saint Rose Philippine Duchesne.

May the leisure and rest some are able to enjoy during the summer serve the good purpose of enabling us to return with fresh joy and energy to our daily life!
