Angels By Sister M. Regina, L.M.

This Sunday falls between the feasts of angels: the Feast of Saint Michael on Saturday and the Feast of the Guardian Angels on Tuesday.

We most often see Saint Michael battling Satan, and we invoke him in that role when we recite the Prayer to Saint Michael. His name means "Who is like God!" Saint Gregory the Great writes: "Whenever some work of heroic proportions is to be performed, Michael is commissioned. Thus from the work and from the name of the Angel we are given to understand that nobody is able to do such things as only God can accomplish." If you have some "work of heroic proportions," some important intention, remember to invoke Saint Michael!

Saint Michael also has the task to lead souls safely to heaven. On Saturday, September 22nd, there was a sung Requiem Mass at Saint Mary's. We Sisters had the honor of singing the chant for the offertory. The English translation of the text describes Saint Michael's role with regard to the souls of the faithful departed: "O Lord Jesus Christ, King of glory, deliver the souls of all the faithful departed from the lion's jaws that hell may not swallow them up...rather may the standard-bearer St. Michael lead them into the holy light." Then, at Lauds for the Feast of Saint Michael, one of the antiphons describes this function again: "Archangel Michael, I have appointed you prince and guardian over all souls on their journey home." We all know people who are in danger of straying from the path on their journey through this life to life eternal. Let us invoke Saint Michael on their behalf, asking him to perform his duty of guarding souls on their journey home.

The feast of the Guardian Angels reminds us how close angels are to us. In His goodness, God assigns each of us one angel to be near us and to protect us during the entire course of our journey on earth. His only duty is to help us to arrive safely in our homeland in heaven. Saint Bernard of Clairvaux writes: "Be alert in your every action as one should be who is accompanied by angels *in all your ways*, for that mission has been enjoined upon them. In whatever lodging, in whatever nook or corner you may find yourself, cherish a reverence for your guardian angel. In his presence do not dare to do anything you would not do in mine. Or do you doubt his presence because you do not see him? Would it really help if you did hear him, or touch him, or smell him? Remember, there are realities whose existence has not been proven by mere sight."

In his reflection upon the Feast of the Guardian Angels, Father Pius Parsch encourages us with the following words: "[T]here *is* a spirit world. It is a world teeming with beings both good and evil; and these are all about us. Holy Scripture gives abundant proof. It is time now to stir up our faith and with the eye of the spirit recognize the angels and devils present in our very midst. We are far too prone to consider them distant as heavens, unreal upon earth. They are *very* real. Angels and demons encircle us from the cradle to the grave; and about every person rages a spirit battle, like that between Lucifer and Michael."

Saint Michael the Archangel, pray for us! Our Holy Guardian Angels, pray for us!

All this happened for me right here in our beloved St. Mary's. This parish will always be the home that I came from and the home I long to return to.

I want to thank each and every one of you for receiving me and my family and making us feel so at home here at St. Mary's. A very special thank you to Father Matthew for giving me the opportunity to serve the Parish, for being a spiritual Father and a best friend. October 5—Feast of Saint Anna Schäffer

The relics entombed in the altar at Saint Mary's are those of Saint Anna Schäffer, canonized on October 21, 2012. (Her picture is on the front cover of this week's bulletin). On the occasion of Saint Anna's feastday, we reprint here the article published in the bulletin last year.

Anna Schäffer was born on February 18, 1882 in Bavaria, Germany. Her family was poor and the young Anna therefore had to work outside the house as a maid, in order to help her family. One day, when she was just a few days shy of her 19th birthday, she had an accident: she slipped and fell into the bucket of boiling lye in which she was washing laundry. Her legs were severely burnt. Although Anna received medical treatment and even underwent many operations, nothing could be done to heal her legs. As a consequence, Anna remained bed-ridden for the remainder of her life until her death at the age of 43. The painful wounds on her legs had to be dressed every day, and it was her mother who took care of Anna for the remainder of her life.

Anna sanctified her suffering and her great consolation was the reception of Holy Communion every day. She wrote: "I cannot write by pen how happy I am every time after Holy Communion. Ah, I forget my earthly suffering and the longing of my poor soul draws me every moment to adore my God and Savior hidden in the Blessed Sacrament!"

Anna had three apostolates during the many years she was bed-ridden: the first was her suffering which she bore for the sake of the Church and for the sake of souls; the second was her apostolate of writing to persons to encourage them to live holy lives, and the third was to make beautiful hand-crafts for others. On the occasion of her Beatification, Pope Saint John Paul II said: "[S]he was given to [us] to grow in the correct understanding that weakness and suffering are the pages on which God writes His Gospel...Her sickbed became the cradle of an apostolate that extended to the whole world."

In 1925, Anna was diagnosed with colon cancer. Her suffering increased, and, in January of that year, she wrote: "The most important thing for me is to pray and suffer for the Holy Church and her Pastors. Whenever I receive Holy Communion, I fervently pray to our beloved Redeemer to continue protecting His holy Church and her Pastors, to grant me the most agonizing martyrdom and to accept me as a little victim of reparation."
